








## THE CONTEXT: HOUSING AFFORDABILITY CHALLENGES AND POLICY RESPONSES




#### Housing cost overburden rate among low-income owners (with mortgage) & tenants

Share of population in the bottom quintile of the income distribution spending more than 40% of disposable income on mortgage and rent, by tenure, in percent, 2019 or latest year available






#### **Real house price index**


2005, 2019 and 2021, 2015=100


#### Household composition, by type, among young people aged 20 to 29 years old in percent, 2019 or latest available year

Government spending as % of GDP, 2020 or last year available




# The size of the social housing stock varies considerably across countries.

Number of social rental dwellings as a share of the total number of dwellings, 2020 or latest year available


